FRIENDS' TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY: ANNUAL BOARD MEETING AND LUNCHEON



On May 15, The Friends will have its annual Board of Directors' meeting and luncheon. The board meeting will begin at 9:30 in Doolittle Hall. The luncheon will be held at the Academy Officers' Club with a social hour beginning at 11:30 and lunch at 12:00. Our speaker for the occasion is Dr. Phillip Meilinger, a retired Air Force colonel, who has contracted with The Friends to write a biography of Lt. Gen. Hubert R. Harmon. A 1970 graduate of the Air Force Academy, Dr. Meilinger holds an MA from the University of Colorado and a PhD from the University of Michigan. He had a long and distinguished Air Force career as both a C-130 pilot and as a renowned scholar. He served in the history department at the Air Force Academy, as well as on the faculty of the Naval War College and as Dean of the School of Advanced Air Power Studies at the Air University. THE GRADUATE WAR MEMORIAL HERITAGE PROJECT



The Graduate War Memorial Wall

For more than a year The Friends of the Academy Library has been deeply involved in a historic Air Force Academy heritage project. The goal of the multi-year project is to gather all available material located in various offices at the Academy dealing with the lives of the 168 Air Force Academy graduates whose names are inscribed on the Academy's Graduate War Memorial Wall and to consolidate all of that information in one place where it would be more readily accessible.

The War Memorial Wall contains the names of Academy graduates killed as a result of hostile action during a state of military conflict. The Association of Graduates (AOG) spear-headed the fund-raising efforts for the memorial and presented it to the Cadet Wing during Homecoming on October 10, 1970. It stands in the cadet area on the north end of the Air Gardens, facing the American flag. A smaller replica of the War Memorial Wall, a gift from the Class of 1970, is located adjacent to the AOG building, Doolittle Hall.

Both the War Memorial Wall and its smaller replica are visible reminders to all who see them of the ultimate sacrifice graduates have made in service to their country. The simple inscription on the memorial "In memory of our fellow graduates who have fallen in battle ..." reminds everyone of the devotion to duty and courage required of those called upon to serve their country.

It is very appropriate that The Friends' volunteer team members who are working this project are all Academy graduates: Jock Schwank, '60 (Friends' Treasurer); Andi Biancur, '60; Dick Sexton, '60; and, Dick Coppock, '61. Their goal is to finish the collection and electronic storage of all of the material located at the AOG by this summer. The team will then move its operation to the McDermott Library where they will begin to sort through the extensive materials in the Clark Special Collections Branch.

DR. SCOTT GIVES LIBRARY STATUS REPORT TO THE FRIENDS' EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

On January 11, 2007 Dr. Ed. Scott, Director of the Academy's McDermott Library, joined The Friends' Executive Committee to bring the group up to date on Library issues. As usual, Dr. Scott gave a very informative summary of his concerns as well as ideas for future projects that might be underwritten by The Friends.

Dr. Scott reported that for the third time in the past four years, the Library ranked among the top 10 (of more than 360) academic libraries in the United States. We were pleased to learn of the Library's well deserved recognition. Dr. Scott pointed out that the Air Force Academy Library is not nearly as well funded or staffed as is West Point's and



The bulk of Dr. Scott's report focused on potential Friends' projects for the Library. The list was comprehensive, and, while many suggestions must wait future funding, some are presently under consideration for 2007 and subsequent years. The proposed projects include publication of several brochures designed to highlight Library holdings such as the Clark Rifle Collection and the POW materials housed in the Clark Special Collections Branch. There are also a number of conservation and cataloging projects that need to be accomplished; some of which may be future Friends' projects. Over the years The Friends has purchased many rare or out of print materials for the Library. The Executive Committee is working with the Library to ensure that we continue to contribute in this area. This is only a brief summary of some of the potential projects Dr. Scott emphasized in his comprehensive report. 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UPDATE FROM THE McDERMOTT LIBRARY

The McDermott Library has changed its hours to reflect the new cadet schedule and is again open 7:00am-10:30pm Monday through Thursday, 7:00am-5:00pm on Friday, 9:00am-5:00pm on Saturday, and 2:00pm-10:30pm on Sunday. The Library will be closed for cadet events, spring break, and holidays. The Medical Library, which shares cataloguing and subscriptions with the McDermott Library, has been terminated by higher authority, and is permanently closing on August 1, 2007. Although some items will go to the cadet library, most of the holdings will be sent to Fort Carson for disposal.

The Library has upgraded to a new server and is planning to put more materials on the internet. You can access the Library's website from The Friends' website or directly at <u>http://www.usafa.af.mil/df/dflib</u>.

The Clark Special Collections branch has been busy with visitors to the Gimbel Room and with researchers, both cadets and historians working with donated holdings. The Smithsonian Air and Space Museum requested a loan extension of the Wright Brothers' artifacts from the Gimbel collection. You can see them in the Centennial of Flight exhibit if you happen to be in Washington, D.C. We are also lending items to the Wisconsin Veterans Museum which is doing a temporary exhibit on Capt. Lance P. Sijan.

VISITING THE CADET AREA AND MCDERMOTT LIBRARY

Although visitors are now allowed free entry at both the North and South Gates, visitors to the cadet area are still restricted. **DoD cardholding visitors** who are not assigned to an agency within the cadet area will be issued a 1-day badge and 1-day parking pass in exchange for a driver's license at the cadet entry gates near Sijan Hall and the Tennis Courts [Fieldhouse]. These visitors will be asked the nature of their business and issued either a V (Visitor) badge for making a delivery, dental appointment, or other business not requiring building access, or a T (Temporary) badge for cadet area access including the Library. DoD cardholders may not escort non-DoD cardholding visitors.

Non-DoD cardholding visitors must be sponsored into the cadet area by Academy staff. Library staff regrets the difficulty of access, but is always delighted to escort a Friend of the Library or non-DoD cardholding visitors. Please call ahead to Mary Elizabeth Ruwell at (719) 333-4674 or Ed Scott at (719) 333-2590. They can meet visitors at the North Gate parking lot, the Visitors Center, or the Officers Club. Because of security concerns, groups larger than five must make arrangements at least two weeks in advance of their visit.
