
THE FRIENDS HAVE AN EXCITING NEW WEBSITE


PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

CLARK-YUDKIN FELLOW PUBLISHES IN AIR COMMANDO JOURNAL

Mr. Patrick J. Charles, a historian with Air Force Special Operations Command and the 2013 recipient of a Clark-Yudkin Research Fellowship, recently advised The Friends that an article based on his fellowship research has been accepted for publication in the Air Commando Journal.

Mr. Charles originally intended to investigate the origins of the World War II "Air Commandos," a U.S. Army Air Forces (USAAF) special operations unit created in 1943 for service in the China-Burma-India Theater. That plan changed when Dr. Mary Elizabeth Ruwell, Chief of the Library's Clark Special Collections Branch, brought to Mr. Charles's attention the papers of Maj. (Dr.) Cortez Enloe, a USAAF flight surgeon who served with the 1st Air Commando Group (1 ACG). Among the Enloe Papers, Mr. Charles found a detailed first-hand account of "Operation Thursday," the code name for a 1944 operation in which the 1 ACG supported

British ground forces operating deep behind enemy lines in North Burma. Describing this previously untapped primary source as one that "sheds new light on the history of the World War II Air Commandos," Mr. Charles has summarized his findings in the article that will appear in the Spring 2015 issue of *Air Commando Journal* (http://www.aircommando. org/?q=content/air-commandojournal).

Drawing on his work in the Enloe Papers, Mr. Charles plans to undertake a more in-depth examination of the leadership of the 1 ACG, in particular the role of its commander, Col. Philip G. "Flip" Cochran. One of the most colorful airmen of his day, Cochran was the real-life role model for the pilot-hero of Milton Caniff's long-running Terry and the Pirates cartoon strip. Mr. Charles also proposes to take a closer look at the execution of "Operation Thursday," the second largest airborne invasion of World War II (after "Operation Overlord,"

the invasion of Normandy).

Mr. Charles's important contribution to Air Commando historiography was made possible only because the late Dr. Enloe's daughters, Cynthia and Margaret Enloe, generously donated their father's papers to the Special Collections Branch in 1996. As part of its mission to enhance the Library's holdings and thereby its reputation as a research center for the study of airpower, The Friends welcome any opportunity to facilitate the donation of such collections to the Special Collections Branch.

CLARK SPECIAL COLLECTIONS BRANCH UPDATE

The Friends are working on the transportation of Lt. Col. Julian W. Bradbury's papers and books to the Special Collections Branch. "Brad" Bradbury, former professor of Political Science at the Academy, died in December before he could accomplish his dream of creating a center for Special Operations research in the McDermott Library. He had acquired many primary and secondary sources for the proposed center before his death; many have been transferred to Special Collections, but many others are still at Air Force Village in San Antonio, Texas, where he lived.

The Friends are also encouraging the donation of Vietnam War

documentation. Special Collections has been designated as the repository for Misty FAC materials (Misty was the call sign of F-100 Forward Air Controllers in Vietnam). We are interested in acquiring and preserving for the historical record papers, flight logs, photographs, and other materials related not only to those operations but also to the Vietnam War generally.

The branch is also grateful for other recent donations, including the Kriegie diary of Alexander Jefferson, author of *Red Tail Captured; Red Tail Free: Memoirs of a Tuskegee Airman and POW*, published by Fordham University Press in 2005. Recent book purchases by The Friends for Special Collections.

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SMALL ADVENTURES AND SURPRISING DISCOVERIES IN THE CLARK SPECIAL COLLECTIONS BRANCH

For many years, volunteers supplemented the work of the Special Collections Branch staff. In 2008 The Friends began to sponsor independent contractors— Karen Millis, Travis Pollok, Jennifer Murphy, Katherine Smith, and me, Melissa Robohn—to provide that support over different periods of time. I would like to give you an idea of what we have been doing this past year.

During 2014, we completed an inventory of non-Gimbel materials in Special Collections. While The Friends have previously sponsored this work for the Gimbel Collection, the rest of the Special Collections items, including materials on falconry, had not been inventoried for some time. Of the 742 non-Gimbel items that were added to Special Collections in 2014, about 500 were books and periodicals that had dropped out of the computer system. During the course of the inventory we were able to identify these items and place their record back in the system, making the materials accessible for cadet and faculty use.

We have also been working through the shelves in the Gimbel Room vault to identify and catalog many items, including some donated by Richard Gimbel, that have never been processed. Additionally, we have been identifying and cataloging the books and journals transferred from the Research Library at Hanscom AFB. Many of these are scientific publications in their original editions that will expand significantly the Library's collection of such materials. Finally, we have been developing and adding new content to the website used by Special Collections, and adding more content to existing online collections such as the Gimbel and Stalag Luft III materials. Katherine Smith, for example, digitized the papers of General Laurence S. Kuter.

The importance of the work we are doing became very apparent to me at The Friends' annual luncheon this past year. I was seated next to the widow and daughter of one of the manuscript collection donors. His widow expressed some concern that the materials would be too hard for researchers to access and use due to the security and visiting restrictions at the Academy. Travis Pollok and I had just finished creating a web page and posting materials for that very collection! I described to her the work we had been doing to create digital copies of our collections, including her husband's that everyone might access online.

Our work in Special Collections is developing in many exciting ways. The launch of the project to collect materials on RPVs/UAVs (remotely piloted vehicles/unmanned aerial vehicles); the steady stream of small treasures still to be "re-discovered" in the Hanscom collection; and the continuing additions of digitized material to the website make 2015 look like a very promising year indeed.
